Fearing Pain

Tracie is a 52 year old Human Services
Program Manager at Manatee County.
Sitting at her desk all day, she began to
experience knee pain 4 years ago. Her
orthopedic specialist diagnosed her with
osteoarthritis. He withdrew fluid, injected
cortisone, and advised her to avoid things
like walking up stairs. She began to avoid
activity but the pain persisted until she was
taking 8 ibuprofen a day.

Movement is Medicine

Tracie's husband was on the Hinge Health back program and encouraged her to try the knee program. She was worried that the exercises would hurt, but her health coach helped her create small, achievable goals, and she learned that movement helped pain. Tracie can now move without fear. She confidently works out her lower body at the gym, and was inspired to start a nutrition program. She can't even remember the last time she took ibuprofen.
